Statement by the Delegation of the Republic of Indonesia

Thematic Debate of the First Committee of the 77th Session of the UN General Assembly

Cluster: Nuclear Weapons

New York, 14 October 2022

Mr. Chairman,

- Indonesia associates itself with the statements of NAM and ASEAN.
- 2. Our commitment towards the realization of a world free of nuclear weapons is uncontested.
- 3. However, in 77th year of our work in pursuing nuclear disarmament, its status remains inadequate.
- 4. The risk of using nuclear war becomes ever present.
- 5. Nine countries maintain possession over 13.000 nuclear weapons.
 - → Whilst, a handful of States host nuclear weapons in their territories, allowing potential use on their behalf.
 - → At the same time, advancement and modernizations of nuclear weapons and delivery system continues.
- 6. The lack of commitment from Nuclear Weapons States (NWS) is apparent.
 - → NWS continue to reject timelines or benchmark as well as any meaningful and ambitious commitment
 - → NWS also continue justifying international security environment as a pretext to maintain their possession on nuclear weapons.

- 7. Trust among members states continue to decrease as the 10th NPT Review Conference failed to achieve yet another consensus.
- Amidst this situation, we are pleased to recognize the successful First Meeting of States Parties of the TPNW and the adoption of its outcome document.
- 9. This success offered hope in the nuclear disarmament landscape.

Mr. Chairman,

- 10. Allow me to me highlight **three** important points for our Delegation on the issue of nuclear disarmament.
- 11. **FIRST**, nuclear disarmament is an enabler of international security and stability.
- 12. The current challenging situation should not justify the continued possession of nuclear weapons, neither should they justify the use or threat of use of such weapons.
- 13. We should make it clear, Indonesia condemn unequivocally any and all nuclear threats, irrespective of the circumstances.
- 14. **SECOND**, urgent and concrete actions shall be pursued towards nuclear disarmament.
- 15. Nuclear-armed states have the responsibility to immediately step up their efforts in advancing nuclear disarmament.
- 16. Relevant States should also take steps to stop hosting nuclear weapons in their territories and reject the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons on their behalf.
- 17. **THIRD**, we all need to reignite efforts towards the realization of the long-overdue:

- → Comprehensive convention on nuclear weapons;
- → Legally binding instruments on effective international assurances for non-nuclear weapons states against the use and threat of use of nuclear weapons;
- → Balanced treaty banning the production of fissile material for use in nuclear weapons or other nuclear explosive devices;
- → Institutionalized nuclear weapon free zone where they cease to exist and immediate entry into force of the CTBT; and
- → Strengthened relevant measures, such as verification and transparency, which contribute towards a world without nuclear weapons.

Mr. Chairman,

- 18. This year, the First Committee will once again deliberate on a number of resolutions pertinent to nuclear weapons.
- Let me assure you that Indonesia will continue to extend our support to the draft resolutions, with a view to advance nuclear disarmament.
- 20. Nuclear disarmament machineries suffered enough this year. We cannot afford another setback.
- 21. The First Committee should reverse the trend to mitigate the catastrophic risks posed by nuclear weapons... in the interest of the very survival of humanity.
